Please find herewith my individual response as member of the Academic Council to the minutes of the 143<sup>rd</sup> (A) and (B) meetings of the Academic Council of the University.

First, please also record my objection to the fact that none of the objections/dissents submitted by members of the 142<sup>nd</sup> (A) meeting of the Academic Council (including myself), given both on the floor of the house in the 142<sup>nd</sup> AC and in writing subsequently, have been included in the minutes. The minutes of the 142<sup>nd</sup> (A) meeting of the Academic Council were not confirmed by the House and the Chair/Secretary's conclusion that the minutes were passed is, therefore, false.

Second, I would like to state that at the reconvened 143<sup>rd</sup> Academic Council meeting of 17<sup>th</sup> June 2017 agenda items were read out one after the other and declared passed. However no discussion was permitted. Many members including myself raised hands, but we were not allowed to speak. Therefore these Minutes cannot be considered as true.

Third, the dissent notes submitted by members in the 143<sup>rd</sup> AC have not been recorded under their name in the minutes. Therefore, these Minutes cannot be regarded as correct.

Fourth, please refer to the Minutes of Part B, specifically the Ordinance no 13, page 46 (Annexure -VII, Item No 7/AC (B) 16.06.2017). This item effects the de-recognition of the MPH/PhD programme (along with other programmes of other Schools in JNU) being offered by the Centre for Social Medicine and Community Health (CSMCH/SSS). It results in fact to the elimination of the Centre's pre-doctoral programme of MPH/PhD – a programme for medical doctors and nurses.

Please note this item was brought to the AC in Part B on page 168 (Annexure -II, Item No 7/AC (B) 09.05.2017). CSMCH was in discussion with the JNU administration on this issue since April 2017. Several letters were sent to the

administration regarding this issue (copies attached). Without coming to a conclusive decision with the Centre, this matter was put up in the 143<sup>rd</sup> AC agenda Part B. Despite raising my hand continuously, you did not permit me to speak. No discussion was held on this matter and it was passed.

Please record my dissent to this item in specific, as this Council never discussed or approved any of the changes to the Ordinances that are being sought to be further modified.

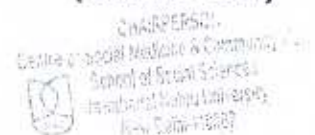
Please also record my objection to the fact that I was not permitted to speak on this matter. Further, a motion proposed by myself and a large number of other members pertaining to this agenda item was not accepted by the Secretary of the Academic Council, without explanation.

In the light of the above I request you to revise the minutes of the 143<sup>rd</sup> Academic Council meeting, both A and B meetings to reflect my dissent. I also request that 143<sup>rd</sup> AC Agenda (B) item No 7 be re-opened for discussion in the light of the objections raised by Centre for Social Medicine and Community Health (CSMCH), School of Social Sciences.

Dear Prof. Mahapatra,

Following my meeting with you on 25.04.2017 along with Dr. Sajjan Singh, A.R. (Eval.) related to our MPH/Ph.D Programme, we had another round of discussion in our Faculty Meeting held on May 1<sup>st</sup>, 2017. On the basis of the discussion, we would like to add the some following points for your kind perusal as a supplement to our response dated 21.04.2017 (ref. No.,807/CSMCH):

1. CSMCH JNU had the MCH (Master of Community Health)/Ph.D. programme at CSMCH from its inception. The academic programmes of the centre were framed in accordance with the recommendations of Prof. Ramalinganni Committee and conform to the mandates of the JNU.
2. The M.Phil./Ph.D. programme at CSMCH was later carved out for social scientists and MCH/Ph.D was ear-marked for doctors and nurses.
3. At the UGC's request/suggestion, MCH was renamed as MPH (Master of Public Health) in 2005-06.

MPH is historically rooted in MCH/Ph.D. that was designed as a M.Phil. level programme from the outset.

4. The subject Social Medicine and Community Health (Code 81) was introduced in the NET/JRF examination in late 1980's/early 1990's with MBBS and MSc (Community Health Nursing) as the eligible degrees medical and nursing graduates of CSMCH have qualified for SMCH (Code 81) for nearly 3 decades and drawn JRF and have been recruited for faculty position on the basis of this NET qualification.

MBBS has, thus, been a degree eligible for entry to M.Phil. level as an eligible qualification for NET/JRF (Master's level degree being otherwise eligible)

5. UGC notified MPH for the first time as a Master's level programme in 2014. It is listed in the Health and Allied Sciences group/category where all Bachelor's level degrees have a duration of 4 to 5 ½ years as these are all professional degrees, distinct from the 'general' BA/B.Sc. degrees that are of a maximum duration of 3 years.

6. As per the 2016 notification (clause 2.1) a professional degree is eligible for admission to MPhil level programmes. This fits in with the historical MCH/Ph.D. programme that was later renamed as MPH/Ph.D. programme.
7. All of JNU's M.Phil./Ph.D. programmes, including the MCH/PhD and now the MPH/PhD programme, have been integrated programs from the inception of the University. This is consistent with the UGC's 2016 notification (page 2993) and does not merit any change.
8. CSMCH has initiated a restructuring process to align the eligibility criteria for admission to MPH in the lines of the 2014 notification of degrees (Health and Allied Sciences group). This process shall be put through the CASR, SSS and BoS, SSS before placing it before the AC

MPH may be restructured to a 64 credit format.

Dear Sir,

Before considering the implications of the UGC Regulations 2016, it is pertinent to review the current MPH/Ph.D. programme and its eligibility condition in the light of the framework of the UGC Regulations 2009 (April 2009) and the UGC specification of degrees (2014).

1. MPH was listed as a Master's level degree in UGC notification, 2009. JNU currently has treated MPH as a pre-Ph.D. degree programme (at par with M.Phil.) in the light of JNU's Ordinance No. 15 where two sets of eligibility conditions were specified:
  - (i) MBBS or M.Sc. Nursing (Community Health) with one year experience for both;
  - (ii) Master's degree in Sociology, Psychology and Anthropology and allied subjects.
2. This is also in consonance with a similar programme in JNU i.e. Integrated M.Sc/Ph.D. programme in Computational and Integrative Sciences programme in the School of Computational and Integrative Sciences.
3. The UGC in its specification of degrees 2014, lists MPH as a Master's degree in the group "Medicine & Surgery/Ayurveda/ Unani/Homeopathy/Health & Allied Sciences/ Paramedical/ Nursing". Degrees in this group are all professional degrees where the bachelor's level degrees all ranging in duration between four to five and a half years.
4. Attention is drawn to clause 2.1 of UGC Regulation 2016 where the eligibility criteria for admission to M.Phil. level programmes is spelt out as follows:
  - (i) A Master's degree; or
  - (ii) A professional degree

Also clause 3 specifies eligibility criteria for admission to Ph.D. programme as:

- (i) Master's degree specifying the criteria under clause 2;
- (ii) Candidates who have cleared M.Phil. course work with 55% marks or equivalent credits and completing M.Phil. degree to proceed to do research work leading to Ph.D. degree in the same institutions in integrated programme

5. The existing JNU Ordinance of MPH (Clause 16) degree specifies professional degrees i.e. MBBS and M.Sc. Nursing as eligibility criteria. This is consistent with 2014 specifications and 2016 regulations of the UGC.

6. The UGC Regulations 2016 also provides for integrated programme that it considers as "progressive and cumulative" as well as "an integrated approach should involve a vertical/inter-disciplinary discourse" (pg. 2993).

The current MPH/Ph.D. programme and M.Phil./Ph.D. programme of CSMCH are integrated, as are all M.Phil./Ph.D. programmes in JNU.

7. CSMCH has already initiated a process for restructuring courses and same has been approved by the Centre Committee vide its meeting dated 23.08.2016. The proposed/amended eligibility criteria for MPH/PhD and M.Phil./PhD eligibility are as follows:

This is consistent with the UGC Regulations 2016 (pages 2990-2991) as well as the UGC 2014 specifications for MBBS and other health sciences degrees.

In summary:

- The current MPH/PhD and M Phil/PhD programs of CSMCH are consistent with the UGC's specifications of degrees (2014) and regulations (2016).
- The proposed restructuring of eligibility conditions (at 7 above) shall be put through due process; i.e. CASR and Board of Studies of the School of Social Sciences and then the Academic Council for modification of the existing Ordinances (Clause 16).

Dear Sir,

This is in reference to your letter dated 11<sup>th</sup> January 2017 seeking Centre's views on adopting a two-stage examination pattern on the basis of Gazette Notification of UGC Regulation 2016 dated 5<sup>th</sup> May 2016. The same is discussed in the Centre and the comments of the faculty members are as under:

1. The Academic Council was informed by the Vice Chancellor that the University shall write to the UGC pointing out JNU's position on the UGC 2016 notifications and for the admission for 2017 old rule remains effective. However, in the EC, the new rule was made effective immediately. The manner in which the 2016 guidelines are being pushed in a hurry is unacceptable. The adoption of these guidelines by JNU has been done without giving Centres and Schools adequate time to discuss, understand its implications and formulate their position.
2. The UGC Notification is only a guideline and not a directive. In the past JNU has not accepted all UGC recommendations. We have contested, debated and chosen not to accept earlier guidelines (1997 guidelines as a case in point).
3. The model that we have to "strictly" follow as stated in Dr Punia's letter was rejected last year in a faculty discussion. The two stage process is neither viable nor acceptable.
4. The format of the admission test cannot be uniform. Each Centre must have the autonomy to decide the format of the test. The objective test method (OMR) may work for the subjects that lend themselves to a way of knowing and mastering the factual details, but where analytical skills are involved this might be impossible. Some subjects like ours need essay type questions where we can judge subject

knowledge, analytical skills, reasoning current issues and debates.

5. In case the notification is accepted as such, it is of May 2016. Hence, the status of those admitted in the present batch (in 2016) needs to be clarified by the Admissions Branch as the existing procedure was followed [70% weightage on written (with variable cutoff for SC/ST/OBC/PH) + 30% weightage on viva plus Deprivation Points] The Admissions Branch need to clarify the following for 2017:
- a. The UGC notification says that the qualifying marks in the written examination is 50%. Is this going to be the same irrespective of different categories (SC/ST/OBC/PH)?
  - b. It is generally understood that all those who score the 50% qualifying criteria shall be called for the viva voce examination.
    - i. Are there any prescribed qualifying marks in the viva? What if none get the qualifying marks? Are we supposed to fail all of them?
    - ii. Shall there be different marks for SC/ST/OBC/PH candidates?
    - iii. If for instance, 350 students appear in the M Phil written examination, and 250 score 50% or above, are all 250 to be called for viva? Currently three times the intake is invited for the viva; if the intake for M Phil is 15, the top 45 are invited currently. In case the number of candidates turns out to be too high, will the calendar be changed accordingly? The new UGC regulation suggests very elaborate mode of interview that is likely to take much longer time. As an example, in case 250 are invited, at least 12 days are required to conduct the viva? Is that accounted for in the admission calendar?
    - iv. In this scenario, will travel allowance be paid to all 250? Has sufficient budget allocation been made to that effect?
  - c. The Report submitted by the Professor Nafey Committee concluded that there is evidence of discrimination.
    - i. Since the report has been accepted, what remedial measures does the University propose to eliminate such discrimination? Is it not the case that the issue of discrimination shall acquire greater relevance as viva alone shall be the criteria of selection?

ii. The VC proposed in the AC that in the light of a lack of consensus on reduction of weightage of viva marks, it shall be left to Schools, Centers and Special Centers to decide on appropriate weightage. Will that be contradictory to 2016 notifications?

d. JNU has a fairly large intake of students in both semesters in the Direct PhD track. There is no written examination currently for this category. Is that going to change? Will there be another examination for the winter semester? Or, admission in winter semester for direct Ph D is being scrapped? A notification in this regard shall be appreciated.

e. What happens to the reservation policy in light of these guidelines? It contravenes the legal position on reservations. Clause 5.2.3 of the UGC notification reiterates "adhere(nce) to the National/State-level reservation policy, as applicable". What is the operational plan for the overall strategy to fulfill obligations of reservation of SC/ST/OBC/PH students?

6. Adoption of the guidelines (keeping faculty- and research student ratios suggested) would mean freezing admissions for Centres such as ours for some year. Questions in that case:

i. What happens to M.Phil and MPH students who become eligible for continuation into Ph.D.?

ii. Would it not be in the interests of the university if it accepted the ratios in principle and moved towards them over the coming years by increasing faculty strength?

As the university that was graded highest by the MHRD in 2016, this should be viewed as a legitimate demand. The JNU administration must forcefully argue this case in the interests of strengthening academic work of the institution, which is its primary mandate

The Committee discussed the advisory issued by UGC and recommends the following:

1. The candidates holding AYUSH-National Eligibility Test (AYUSH-NET) with fellowship are eligible for the interview for admission in M.Phil./Ph.D. programmes under any other National Scholarship examination equivalent to UGC/CSIR-NET (Category-I)
2. P.G Degree holders of AYUSH System of Medicine may be considered equivalent to Masters programmes (M.Sc./M.A.) and are also eligible for the JNU Entrance Examination of the M.Phil./Ph.D. programmes. (Category-I)

Since, these provisions are available in JNU prospectus (Categories I & II mentioned above), the above recommendations may be incorporated for the coming Academic Session 2017-18. Director (Admissions) may look into the matter and do the needful.

The Ministry of AYUSH, Government of India vide its letter D.O.No.D.15020/41/2016-RD dated 24<sup>th</sup> June, 2016 has requested University Grants Commission to issue an advisory to all the educational institutions to include AYUSH disciplines in their institutions for enrollment of candidates in the Ph.D. programs as Ministry of AYUSH has announced Ph.D. programs in AYUSH disciplines from the concerned AYUSH Research Council. AYUSH is aimed at developing Ayurveda, Yoga and Naturopathy, Unani, Siddha and Homoeopathy (AYUSH) systems for healthcare of the people imbibing scientific interventions. The Ministry is committed to encourage research in AYUSH systems for which five autonomous research organizations have been set up by the Central Govt. These organizations/councils are:

- Central Council for Research in Ayurvedic Sciences
- Central Council for Research in Homoeopathy
- Central Council for Research in Yoga & Naturopathy
- Central Council for Research in Unani Medicine and
- Central Council for Research in Siddha

These Councils conduct clinical and basic research studies in intra mural mode and also in collaboration with reputed scientific institutes. These Councils further desire to enhance research opportunities through Ph.D. fellowship program for the development of AYUSH. It intends to sponsor annually 200 candidates (125 PG of AYUSH and 75 PG of Science & technology streams) for pursuing Ph.D on AYUSH research topics.

Accordingly, it is requested that you may include AYUSH disciplines in your esteemed university and in the affiliated colleges for enrollment of candidates in the Ph.D. programs and avail fellowship from the concerned AYUSH Research Council.
